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# China's Global Dominance!

Tith its thriving economy, cutting-edge technology, and powerful military, China is vying for a global role to outperform the US and be in a position to shape the course of world events according to its whims and fancies. However, American and other western scholars have different perspectives on this. Some academics already believe that "China's rise" is unsustainable and that predictions of its triumphs in the world are greatly exaggerated. Others, however, advocate waging trade wars and engaging in military conflicts in the Taiwan Strait or the South China Sea to show a tough face to an arrogant Beijing. Others still think that the West is about to enter a protracted period of conflict known as the New Cold War. There are also those who believe that the rough-spoken and cack-handed attempts to revive a militarily and fiscally overburdened America will unintentionally aid China in achieving its goal of achieving global dominance.

Beijing's ruling elite no longer holds Deng Xiaoping's era of "crossing rivers by feeling for stones" in high regard; instead, they affirm their faith in Xi Jinping's fearless "crossings of oceans." Many academics believe that China's newfound global role is consistent with the Confucian principle of "all under one heaven," and central to this, they contend, is that China is a growing power with the potential to become a big power. They praise China for its role as a force for moral, economic, and political good throughout the world.

Concerns about China's struggle for global supremacy have arisen in recent decades as a result of its growing economic and geopolitical influence. With its Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), which serves as a prominent example of its global ambitions, the nation has quickly grown to be one of the largest economies in the world and a significant player in global trade and investment. In addition to border tensions with India and territorial disputes with neighbouring nations, such as those in the South China Sea, China's efforts to enlarge its sphere of influence can also be seen in the country's growing military power and assertiveness in international affairs.
